1 Introduction

Landslides were recognized as a process of contributing to an outward and backward charge in hilly slope resources made of native soil, sand, synthetic cover, and part combination 52 the primary causes of landslides are gravitational force and groundwater flow inside the soil. In many parts of the world, land depletion in a sensitive ecosystem of mountainous terrain is becoming a major issue. Because of its effect on the potential loss of production, economic influence, and social losses, latid depletion is a serious concern.217 The principal causes of land loss are steep bills with poor vegetation cover and increased human interference. This adds to a number of negative consequences, such as soil deterioration, reduced kind quality, degradation of local hydrology networks, and limited capacity to store water with hauled sedimentary racks and contaminants." Therefore, the current rate of degradation processes may be halled through the implementation of innovative management strategies." Soil has a leading role in influencing or intensifying the loss of productivity that comes from the soil, including agricultural products. The integrated behavior of microclimate variables (aridity, sogather events, rainfall existion) and human mismanagement (intermittent drought, thin soil horizons, poor soil organic matter, scarce vegetation cover), and human pressure (overgrazing, defonistation, agricultural intensification, tourism growth)." 17 Soil depletion is the depletion of soil ecological resources and functions.12 Almost 30% of the world's soils has been exhausted, and they need to be analyzed and documented to improve their management and use.¹² The deterioration of land in India is reported to continue on 147 million bectame (MIDM or Mham), including 94Mha m of river erosion, 16Mha m of acidification, 14Mha m of floods, 9Mha m of wind erosion, 6 Mha m of salinity, and 7 Mha m of mixing factors. This is incredibly series since India promotes 18% of the world's population and 15% of the world's form production, but only 2.4% of the world's population. The cause of soil degradation is often massively complex, with varying dimensions, including low and reduced land fertility, vegetation, wasystems, and the decline in ecosystem-derived economic and social resources. Six soil depletion processes, such as water, wird and tilling, degradation, topsoil depletion, compressibility, saline intrusion, alkyl rature, policition, and less of biodiversity, have been defined as induced or aggravated by poor agricultural practices. Soil stodibility is an indication of land loss sensitivity and is defined by the physical properties " of scil. Soli degradation can occur over a short period of time owing to ineffective land management, although soil restoration can take a long time or decades to form. The design and management of land use studies are also needed to support choice-making and public policy, ensure real-time soil quality and lead to sustainability." This chapter delegants knowledge to help better-informed decision-making on the conservation of fragile hillsides and the management of ecosystems, focusing on controlling soil crossion.

Landslides are among the most dangeness environments and can cause significant damage to human life and busiress habits.¹ The drive impact of landslide assortments from the gradual measurement of material to a need landslide of a significant volume of debris in the range of millimeters/centimeters per year.² These are two primary factors for landslides. First, it is a cause by nature (inevitable) that is away from the centrol of the human being and onler. Second, man-made landslides are generated by rising environmental forces in the form of construction work, illegal mining, strong ground apparatus movements, and semitimes hills-cutting. There are several examples of negative landslide signs in different regions of India, India has experienced humful landslides in the past few years.

In 2020, states such as Kerala, Karnatoka, Tamilnadu, and Maripur have played a vital role in landslides near the TNEB colony, Emerald, Kundah Taluk, which is located in Nilgiris district, Tamil Nadu, after a hex of heavy minifall of about 34.5 cm (for the period ending 24h, another one has occurred in Talacsuvery on August 6, 2020, around 62.30 am, because of the same heavy rain, near Talacanvery Temple on Brahmagiri hills rear Bhagamarsdala in Kodagu district, Kamataka. The Longmuri landslide occurred during the last week of June 2020, along the upslope of the NH-37, the Imphal-Jiribase road approximately 500 m from Noney Bazar towards Imphal, Manipur, In July 2020 in Mas town, which has affected an area of about 0.6 sq.km in the same Manipur. Landslides in Papumpare District, Arunachal Pradesh, heo notable landslide occurred in a village called Tigdo, which was destroyed on July 10, 2020. Another in Donyi Colony around 8:12 am on June, 25:06:2020. Two landslides occurred in each Dhare and Stala area, and the other recurred in Kabi Village in North Sikki.²

Soil erosion has resulted from the continuous destruction of dryland habitats induced by both climate conditions and human activity, including improper land use/land conservation." Land destruction has had a major impact on the sustainable protection of land and has caused a significant risk to food safety and has had an impact on sustainable social and economic development. Soil loss is a socio-economic problem and is not just an environmental concern affecting humanity.10 The impact of climate change has been slowly increasing; indeed, those caused by human activities are rapidly increasing and becoming more serious." In the twenty-first century, the study of soil degradation, in particular its mechanism, adaptive development, temporal and spatial spread, as well as defensive measures for soil ecosystem regeneration and reconstruction, has been a high priority in many disciplines, such as ecology and geography.²² Land degradation studies currently focus largely on the guiding factors of land degradation, land degradation reduction and management steps, and methodologies for measuring land degradation.12 The land degradation mechanism includes two interconnected dynamic processes, that is, the natural ecosystem and social system of humans, and all shifts in the physical and socio-economic factors can influence the process of soil deterioration.11 Multiple factors impact soil erosion through neutrent pressures induced by severe and prolonged climate change, where human actions contribute to soil deterioration.

- Deforestation, destruction of biodiversity, and subarban development lead to shifts in terms of ground usage and cover.
- (2) Inappropriate methods of agricultural land management, such as fortilizer usage and violence, chemical pesticides, and metals.

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
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

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Introduction

Ending all kinds of hunger by 2030 is a difficult but crucial goal, in light of the short timeline ahead, severe global health and socioeconomic effect, as stated by UN-Development Goal 2 (UN-SDG 2). Micronutrient malnutrition or hidden starvation affects approx. one-third of the global population, and seriously threatens the growth of the economy. A sensible mix of traditional breeding and metabolic engineering techniques should make it possible to make a leap forward in the next decade (Van Der Straeten, D., et al 2020).Metabolic engineering is usually described as the manipulation of one or more enzyme processes in order to increase the synthesis of existing chemicals in an organism, or to mediate their breakdown. This technique entails the over expression or down regulation of certain proteins in a metabolic pathway, resulting in the production of a novel product by the cell. The first step toward effective engineering is gaining a thorough knowledge of the host cell that will be modified genetically. Additionally, the impact of genetic modification on growth should be investigated. Genetic modification may have a detrimental impact on metabolic load. For example, over expression of phosphoenol pyruvate through genetic modification suppresses the heat shock response and nitrogen regulation. To get the product, various techniques are employed to modify the host cell, including the removal of competing pathways and harmful byproducts and the expression of a heterologous enzyme

enumerates complete Gymnosperm and Angiosperm taxa for the south Indian state of Karnataka. This includes a total of 6447 plant taxa of which Gymnosperms contribute 55 taxa belonging to 10 families, 22 genera, 55 species and 1 variety while Angiosperms contribute 6392 plant taxa belonging to 211 families, 1807 genera, 6151 species, 128 subspecies, 376 varieties and 7 formae. Among these, 1757 taxa are cultivated and 4635 taxa are wild/naturalised. All the taxa are arranged family-wise alphabetically with accepted botanical name, basionym and synonym(s) if any (largely following APG IV classification), habit, flowering & fruiting season, distribution in Karnataka, endemism, threat status and medical system.

Gymnosperms comprise 4 endemic taxa, 7 threatened taxa and 18 taxa used in various medical systems while Angiosperms comprise 1407 endemic taxa, 560 threatened taxa and 2251 taxa used in various medical systems. Kannada names are given for 1021 taxa of Angiosperms and 2 taxa of Gymnosperms. Photographs are given for selective plants that are endemic to Karnataka, Western Ghats, peninsular India and India.

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Immobilization of Au nanoparticles on synthetically modified magnetic cored PAMAM dendrimer for catalytic aerobic oxidation of alcohol

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Abstract

Amine enchired dendrimer was synthesized from silica coated magnetic core G_3 PAMAM dendrimer by reduction and the periphery was grafted with carboxylate groups to improve the dispersibility of the nanomaterial. Gold nanoparticles were immobilized on to the dendritic entity by reduction method. The immobilization of ultrafine shape-controlled gold nanoparticles were confirmed from XRD patterns, HRTEM, EDAX, VSM, XPS etc. These ultrafine gold nanoparticles on the magnetic cored dendrimer was utilized as a green sustainable catalyst for the aerobic oxidation of alcohol under mild reaction conditions. The nanocatalyst was recovered by magnetic separation from any medium. Hence, this Au nanoparticles immobilized silica coated magnetic cored polyamine G_3 dendrimer [Fe₃O₄/SiO₂/PNPEDAG₃-COOH] can be recovered, reused and regenerated up to many catalytic cycles without any significant loss in catalytic efficiency.

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
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
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

Pricing Strategies

The following are some of the important pricing strategies.

1) Skimming pricing strategy

A high premium price is charged when a product is launched in the market. This strategy aims at high profit margins in the early stages of product introduction. The skimming pricing strategy can be of two types i.e. –

a) Rapid skimming pricing -

When high prices are charged, and the product is promoted with heavy promotional expenditure.

b) Slow skimming pricing -

Where high prices are charged, and there is limited promotional effort to promote the product.

2) Penetration pricing strategy -

A strategy of charging law prices in the early stages of product introduction in the market is called "Penetration Pricing Strategy".

The objective is to launch a new product at a lower price to capture as large a share of the market as possible within a short time.





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

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
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
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CHAPTER 10 A STUDY ON BUSINESS PROCESS RE-ENGINEERING IMPLEMENTATION

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<u>Abstract</u>

As more and more organizations choose business process reengineering (BPR), issues within the implementation of BPR projects tend to be a significant concern. There is a need to explore empirically the problems of reengineering implementation. Supported by past theories and research related to the implementation of organizational change furthermore as field experience of reengineering experts, a comprehensive list of sixty-four BPR implementation problems was identified. Results of the various studies have clearly demonstrated the importance of change management in implementation (BPR). Project planning and technological competence were found to be necessary for reengineering success. Further, problems that are more directly associated with the conduct of a project like process delineation, project management, and tactical planning were perceived as more easy, yet highly associated with project success. This example was also true for human resource problems like training personnel for the redesigned process. These findings suggest that reengineering project implementation is complex, involving many factors. To succeed, it's essential that change be managed which balanced attention be paid to all or any identified factors, including those who are more contextual (e.g., management support and technological competence) similarly as factors that pertain on to the conduct of the project (e.g., project management and process delineation). Mutually of the primary pieces of empirical evidence supported a field study, this research emphasizes the importance of addressing BPR implementation within the broader context of organizational change during a complex socio-technical environment.

Business process reengineering is the reconstruction of a core business process to Business process reengineering is the enhance product production, quality or cost reduction. It typically involves evaluating enhance product production, quanty or unreliable procedures and seeking ways of getting client workflows, identifying subpar or unreliable procedures and seeking ways of getting rid of or improving them. In the 1990s, reengineering was popular in the world of business, inspired by an article entitled Reengineering Work: Don't Automate, a work published by Michael Hammer in the Harvard Business Review. He believed that too many businesses used new technologies to simplify inherently inefficient processes rather than to develop something else based on new technologies. Think, using technology to "upgrade" a horse with lighter horseshoes which make them faster, as opposed to just building a car. Proper implementation of the reengineering business process can be a shift for any organization. When properly handled, a company with a failed or stagnant business process may perform miracles, raise profit and lead to growth. However, the reengineering of business processes is not the most understandable concept.

This involves changing the company - dismantling something that is used to people and creating something different. In the decades since, BPR has remained a popular choice for organizations as an alternate to business process management (automation or reuse of existing processes) and BPR is much more important than ever with the pace of technological change. While handling or developing business processes, which focused on working with existing processes, BPR requires fundamental changes to these processes. This can take a lot of time, be expensive and dangerous. If you do not succeed in every move, your improvements may be ineffective.



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
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

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CHAPTER 7

Hierarchically nanostructured functional materials for artificial photosynthesis

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1. Introduction

Artificial photosynthesis is one of the interesting researches in the field of photochemistry. The photosynthesis of plants or trees by nature is done by converting the carbon dioxide and water into carbohydrates and oxygen under solar energy. In a similar manner, artificial photosynthesis is also performed by the conversion of carbon dioxide and water into hydrogen fuels as well as carbon-based products using sunlight [1]. In artificial photosynthesis, the photon energy is converted into chemical energy through the photocatalytic process. In order to process the above reaction, an efficient and highly stable photocatalytic arrangement is crucial. Generally, various metal oxide-based materials such as TiO₂, ZnO, Fe₂O₃ Cds, and Cu₂O have been studied for CO₂ photoreduction. However, their working efficiency is not sufficient due to their large band gap, high recombination rate, and cost. Alternatively, hierarchical nanostructures of these metal oxide materials could offer less band gap, large surface area, high CO₂ adsorption, and enhanced photocatalytic properties [2]. Also, hierarchical nanostructured materials can provide a conceivable way to enhance the photocatalytic activity owing to their significant dimensional ratio aspects. Jiao et al. [3] reported that the hollow and mesoporous TiO₂ shows enhanced conversion of CO_2 into CH_4 as compared with solid, low surface area, TiO2 crystals. Accordingly, the synthesis of semiconductorbased photocatalyst with well-defined hierarchical structures is becoming an important parameter to enhance their photocatalytic efficiencies. 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
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Abstract

Leprosy also known as Hansen's disease is an age-old disease, caused by the acid-fast bacterium Mycobacterium leprae. It is classified by WHO as a 'neglected tropical disease'. The disease is characterized by anaesthetic skin patches, nerve damage and progressive deformity and disability. Nearly a quarter of a million people worldwide have leprosy, out of which 60% is from India. Leprosy is curable with a treatment known as multidrug therapy (MDT) taken for 6–12 months. Drug therapy has adverse effects and reversing the damage caused by the bacteria takes long. A viable vaccine would be useful to decrease the incidence of the disease and promote eradication. Mycobacterium indicus pranii (MIP) is an exclusive vaccine for leprosy which has been developed in India. It is believed that MIP has the potential to bring down new cases of leprosy by 60% in 3 years. Extensive field tests were carried out to check the efficacy of MIP. In 2005, large-scale field trials were conducted at Ghatampur, Kanpur Dehat, Uttar Pradesh. About 24,000 people who had close contact with people affected by leprosy were vaccinated with MIP. The protective power of MIP was encouraging: 68.6% were protected for 4 years, and 59% were protected for 8 years. Thus, it was found that the vaccine was effective for 7-8 years, and after that, a booster dose was needed to maintain immunity. One of the greatest barriers to ending leprosy is the stigma which still persists in India, with numerous laws discriminating against people affected by the disease. This discourages others from seeking treatment because they fear being banished once people know that they have the disease. The battle against leprosy must be fought on many

1.1 Introduction





Bio Prospective of Cleistanthin- A in A Bioinformatics Approach

Abstract--- Chemical drug based therapy sometimes result in side effects. Thus there is always a quest for the secured therapy. Hence, phytochemical based therapy is everlastingly a good alternative choice. Accordingly in this current research an attempt is made through bioinformatics search tools to predict the docking compatibility of two compounds such as Cytochalasins B, which is one of the commonly used muscle relaxant and the phytochemical Cleistanthin A, a commonly known active principle of the plant Cleistanthus collinus, are analysed with the acetylcholine family of receptors called as Nicotinic acetylcholine receptor, which usually involves in diseases which are associated with muscle contraction. Online tool PatchDock is used to check the binding compatibility of the two ligands with the receptor.



These receptors are associated with various diseases like congenital myasthenic syndromes, multiple pterygium syndromes, nocturnal frontal lobe epilepsies, addiction, schizophrenia, Alzheimer disease, and Parkinson disease ⁽¹⁾. Nicotinic acetylcholine receptor is involved in mediating or modulating in synaptic transmission. Acetylcholine receptors are well-known therapeutic targets for Alzheimer's disease, schizophrenia, Parkinson's disease, smoking cessation, pain, attentiondeficit hyperactivity disorder, epilepsy, autism and depression (2).
