? Women Empowerment ? GNC Penn Udayal Outreach/Agni Pookkal Women's Brigade: As a step toward community development and women empowerment, GNC launched a pilot outreach initiative through its GNC Penn Udayal program, focusing on self-defense training henceforth called Agni Pookkal Women's Brigade. This initiative aimed to equip Anganwadi teachers, school students, and local women with essential self-defense skills, enhancing their personal safety and confidence. ? Women's Cricket Team Formation: To promote gender equality in sports, GNC established a dedicated women's cricket team. With professional coaching by BCCI-accredited coaches and support from HCL, this team provides female students with structured training, instilling confidence and sportsmanship. ? Women's Sports Tournaments and Mentorship: Women athletes have been actively encouraged to participate in the P.N. Dhawan Cricket Tournament, conducted by Guru Nanak College which celebrates women in sports. In addition, the mentorship program connects novice players with seasoned athletes, fostering a network of support that helps young women build skills, confidence, and career pathways in athletics. ? Promotion of Culture and Tradition ? Millet and Yoga Awareness Programs: The College conducted awareness programs emphasizing the health and environmental benefits of millet consumption, aligning with national initiatives to promote sustainable dietary practices.

Additionally, sessions on the importance of yoga were organized to emphasize holistic wellness and traditional practices, attracting widespread participation from students and faculty. ? Guru Shiksha Competition: In celebration of the 555th birth anniversary of Guru Nanak Dev Ji, the college hosted the 8th edition of Guru Shiksha, an inter-school and inter-college competition that commemorates the legacy of the Char Sahibzaade. This event included cultural and academic contests designed to deepen students' understanding of their heritage. The competition offered 11 lakhs in monetary prizes, alongside trophies and certificates, making it one of the largest cultural events in the region. This celebration fostered an environment of pride and understanding of cultural values among students and the local community. ? Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat (EBSB): Under the EBSB initiative, Guru Nanak College (GNC) was pivotal in strengthening cultural ties between Tamil Nadu and Jammu. The program aimed to foster national integration and mutual understanding by promoting the rich cultural heritage of both states. ? Skill Development ? Partnership with Leading Organizations: Through the Guru Nanak Centre for Skill Development (GNCSD), the college partnered with premier organizations such as the Europe India Foundation of Excellence (EIFE), NASSCOM, AWS Academy, and ICT Academy to offer a comprehensive suite of 30 skillbased courses. These certifications span high-demand areas like data science, cloud computing, banking, finance, insurance, and cybersecurity. ? Campus to Corporate Initiative (STEP): In alignment with the Viksit Bharat initiative and in collaboration with The Hindu, the college launched the STEP "Campus to Corporate" program. This program is tailored to improve students' corporate readiness by enhancing their English language skills, business communication, and professional etiquette. ? Recognition for Excellence: GNC received the Academic Partner Excellence Award 2023 from the ICT Academy for training the highest number of students through ICT Academy Certification Programs. The college also achieved commendations from NASSCOM for its high certification rates, contributing to the Digital Talent Nation initiative. Additionally, the college was honored for its achievements in cybersecurity education, particularly through its partnership with CISCO Academy. ? Sports Promotion ? Intercollegiate Tournaments and Partnerships: GNC organized multiple large-scale sports events, including the 10th Pavit Singh Nayar Memorial T20 All India Cricket Tournament, held in collaboration with the Tamil Nadu Police and Home Guards, and Guru Fest 2K24, an intercollegiate volleyball and basketball tournament. These events provided a platform for students to showcase their athletic skills, compete at a high level, and develop teamwork and resilience. ? Khelo India Para Games and State-of-the-Art Facilities: The Khelo India Para Games were hosted at GNC's Shaheed

Bhagat Singh Sports Complex and Saragarhi Shooting Academy, featuring state-of-the-art shooting ranges of 50 m, 25 m, and 10 m. This initiative positioned GNC as a key promoter of inclusive sports and allowed para-athletes to train and compete in a professional setting. The college players have received accolades on national and international stages, including the squash, swimming, rifle shooting, IPL, TNPL, and U19 national cricket tournaments, underscoring the college's role in nurturing elite-level talent. ? Multidisciplinary Approach in Teaching and Learning ? Curriculum Revamp for Skill Papers: To ensure holistic development, the college introduced updated skill papers for UG and PG students, focusing on communication skills, digital proficiency, and aptitude. Implementation began with a strong emphasis on infrastructure development in the first phase. Guru Nanak College established a robust IT framework to securely manage academic data, incorporating comprehensive data management systems and secure data exchange protocols. This foundation ensures readiness for future demands in digital record and credit management. The ongoing second phase involves transitioning from paper-based records to digital formats and ensuring their accuracy. Rigorous validation processes ensure data reliability, with active collaboration from faculty, staff, and students. Stakeholders play a pivotal role in maintaining institutional standards during this transition, reflecting the college's dedication to seamless digital integration. Once the second phase concludes, the third phase will focus on capacity building. Training programs, seminars, and workshops will equip teachers and staff with the skills needed to use the ABC platform effectively. Students will also receive guidance on managing their academic profiles, enabling smooth credit transfers and enhancing their readiness for employment or further studies. In the fourth phase, all academic data will be formally transferred to the ABC platform, completing the transition to a fully digitized academic system. This step underscores the college's commitment to creating a modern, safe, and flexible academic environment. Guru Nanak College's phased implementation of ABC highlights its proactive approach to advancing higher education. As the institution nears completion of the second phase, it positions itself to offer students a cutting-edge system that fosters academic mobility, lifelong learning, and adaptability to evolving educational demands. Through its focus on infrastructure, data validation, capacity building, and digitization, the college ensures a seamless and future-ready academic experience.

2.5.3 - IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes including Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) have brought in considerable improvement in the Examination Management System (EMS) of the Institution

Guru Nanak College (GNC) uses graded assessments and a semesterbased curriculum by the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS).Credit points are given to each course according to its complexity andhours of instruction, examined by the selected Board of Studies members and authorized by the Academic Council. With opportunities for additional credits through MOOCs, value-added courses, and skill certificates, the program comprises elective, job-oriented, and soft-skills courses. The evaluation includes a 50-mark End Semester Examination (ESE) and a Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA). Exams are held in November/December and April/May, and the ESE is administered at least ninety working days later. ESE eligibility requires a minimum attendance of 75%, with some attendance groups eligible for supplemental tests and a condonation.

Information Technology has been included in examination processes by the GNC's EMS, which offers multi-level secure digital data storage. In addition to assignments, class activities, and attendance, CIA consists of centralized tests and model exams, which add up to 50 points. Additional evaluation standards for practical subjects are determined by student attendance and performance.

The Research Advisory committee and the Guru Nanak Centre for Research (GNCR) serve as hubs for creativity and quality, backing the research ambitions of faculty, staff, and students. Key research initiatives include the G.S. Gill Research Institute (GRI), focusing on insect-plant interactions and integrated pest management, and the Guru Nanak Centre for Incubation, Innovation, and Entrepreneurship & Startup (GNCIIES), which fosters start-ups and entrepreneurial ventures.

The Research Coordination Committee, led by the Principal, ensures alignment with UGC norms and addresses evolving research needs. The college's infrastructure, such as the Central Instrumentation Facility and Data Analytics Lab, is equipped with advanced statistical software like SPSS and AMOS. The IPR Cell protects and enhances intellectual properties, and plagiarism detection software upholds academic ethics.

The Guru Nanak Journal of Multi-Disciplinary Research boosts the college's research output, and the Research Incentive Programme (RIPE) supports researchers through seed money grants. The college also emphasizes undergraduate research through the student research club and GNC Bioclues, the student chapter of Microbiologists' Society of India. Guru Nanak College stands as a testament to a commitment to academic excellence, supported by a robust and well-developed infrastructure. The institutions meticulously designed academic spaces, including the Maharani Vidyavati Devi, Sind, Maharaja Ranjit Singh, Lt. Gen. I.S. Gill, Guru Harkrishan, Guru Amar Das, and Guru Arjan Dev Blocks, are equipped with modern amenities like smart classrooms, Wi-Fi connectivity, and cuttingedge technology.

The Science Block, a cornerstone of the institution, houses state-of-the-art laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Plant Biology, Biotechnology, and Zoology, providing students with hands-on experience and fostering research endeavours. Thirteen well-equipped computer labs, dedicated to areas such as data analytics and skill development, offer students access to the latest technology and software.

Beyond academics, the college emphasises holistic development. A sprawling cricket stadium, a gymnasium, and dedicated courts for basketball and other sports cater to the athletic aspirations of students. The Shaheed Baba Deep Singh Auditorium, a magnificent venue, hosts convocations and cultural events, while seminar halls and discussion rooms facilitate interactive learning.

The administrative infrastructure, encompassing the Kishinchand Chellaram, Punjab, and Central Blocks, houses administrative offices, the library, and support services. The Sahibzaade Multiutility Block further enhances the campus with a medical centre, outreach initiatives, and guest facilities.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 - Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

The Library Department offers a robust collection of over 65,500 books, 6,000+ e-journals by UGC-NLIST, 36 magazines, 10 newspapers, and the GNLMS e-Library. Guru Nanak College houses two Central Libraries and 15 departmental libraries. Central Library 1 serves the Schools of Languages, Sciences, Commerce, and Management, including rare and competitive examination books, with a seating capacity of 100 and 10 user-access computers. Central Library 2 supports the Schools of Humanities, Information Technology, and Physical Education, accommodating 125 users with 20 computers and a dedicated discussion room.

The libraries are fully automated through the web-based Integrated Library Management System (AutoLib), ensuring seamless transactions across all departmental libraries. Operating hours are 8:00 AM to 7:00 PM on working days and 9:30 AM to 1:30 PM during vacations.

Services include reference, lending, e-alerts, and referral assistance. e-Resources include UGC-INFLIBNET (NLIST) and NDLI institutional membership. The e-Access Zones feature 30 internetenabled computers with multimedia kits for academic activities.

GNLMS e-Library serves as a repository for study materials, question banks, and in-house publications. Monthly, the department awards certificates to the Top 10 Library Users and recognizes the Best Outgoing Library User Award annually. The college has been an NDLI member since June 21, 2018.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 - Institution has an IT policy covering Wi-Fi, cyber security, etc. and has allocated budget for updating its IT facilities

The college's IT policy focuses on Wi-Fi, cybersecurity, and data management to support staff, students, and administration. The institution is committed to continuous upgrades to Wi-Fi coverage, software, ERP systems, and ICT-enabled learning solutions.

Robust Infrastructure: The college operates 12 computer labs with 448 high-spec computers (i5, 1TB HDD, 16GB RAM) and UPS support. Additionally, 153 computers are allocated for administrative purposes.

Enhanced Accessibility: Four servers manage systems like Tally, Autolib, and iBoss, with a dedicated server for the COE office, ensuring seamless operations across the campus.

Comprehensive Connectivity: The campus is equipped with 37 Wi-Fi access points, 60 Mbps leased line internet, and 200 Mbps backup from Hathway, supported by an internal fiber-optic LAN for fast, reliable access.

Robust Security: Security measures include a FortiGate 100D firewall, Kaspersky Antivirus, and 201 CCTV cameras for campus surveillance. GNCEMS manages exam schedules, student hall tickets, and result publication.

Dedicated IT Support: The College offers in-house hardware engineers and a mobile app for attendance and schedule management. Official college email addresses with cloud storage are provided to faculty.

Maintaining a Conducive Learning Environment: The Campus Maintenance Committee ensures the upkeep of academic spaces, library resources, electrical systems, plumbing, and fire safety, while the Physical Education Department ensures a green and well-maintained campus.

The institution follows a decentralized and participatory management model, with the General Secretary and Correspondent acting as the Chairman of the Governing Body. Key members of the leadership team, including the Principal, Dean of Academics, Controller of Examinations, Vice Principal (SFS), IQAC Coordinator, and all Deans of Schools and Centres, are involved in policy formulation, budgeting, and strategic planning, with contributions from all stakeholders.

The Management handles critical issues such as financial approvals and appointments. The institution's committees adhere to the guidelines of the UGC and the University of Madras. Staff members are encouraged to freely express their opinions, while egovernance is utilized throughout the institution's operations, under the oversight of the IQAC. 6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Guru Nanak College prioritizes sound financial management, ensuring accountability, fiscal transparency, and compliance with regulatory standards through regular internal and external audits.

Internal audits are conducted quarterly by a Chartered Accountant appointed by the Guru Nanak Educational Society (GNES), who reviews all financial transactions, bills, payments, and receipts. The audit findings are compiled into detailed reports and submitted to the General Secretary and Correspondent for review. Additionally, annual external audits are carried out by independent Chartered Accountant firms, verifying the institution's financial statements, income, expenditure accounts, and balance sheets to ensure compliance with regulatory standards. Grants and scholarships are also audited in line with government regulations, and utilization certificates are submitted for verification. The Finance Committee promptly addresses audit concerns, providing clarifications and supporting documentation.

The resource mobilization policy aims to diversify the institution's financial base to support strategic goals. Budget estimates are prepared annually by the Finance & Accounts department in consultation with academic departments and presented to the Governing Body for approval. The main funding sources include tuition fees, management contributions, grants, scholarships, and consultancy services. These funds are allocated for enhancing teaching methods, supporting student activities, promoting staff welfare, maintaining infrastructure, and advancing research. Expenditures are verified by Chartered Accountants and submitted to funding agencies.

Solid Waste Management:

- Segregation and Collection: Dustbins are strategically placed across the campus for both biodegradable and nonbiodegradable waste. Housekeeping staff ensures daily collection and disposal.
- Biodegradable Waste:
 - Composting: Tree leaf litter is converted into organic manure through composting.
 - Biogas Plant: Food waste from the canteen and Langar is processed to generate biogas, used for cooking and slurry for vermicomposting.
- Non-Biodegradable Waste:
 - Disposal: Broken glassware and unusable furniture are disposed of responsibly, with salvageable items repaired or donated.
 - Recycling: Paper waste is recycled in partnership with ITC Limited.

Liquid Waste Management:

- Drainage and Treatment: Appropriate drainage systems and water-saving fixtures are used to manage RO water and restroom effluent.
- Sewage Treatment Plant: A sewage treatment plant processes both solid and liquid waste.
- Biomedical Waste: Sanitary napkins are incinerated.
- E-Waste: Computers and peripherals are recycled or refurbished.

• Organic Farming: Organic manure from vermicomposting is used to enrich campus gardens.

To organize a Conference on Role of Industry-Academia Collaboration and Capacity Building Programme by inviting notable thought leaders, industry experts with Government / external funding .

To conduct an Orientation Programme for the Newly Recruited Faculty Members to make them understand the working of the College more efficiently.

To arrange training programs on entrepreneurial opportunities in fisheries with industrial experts for providing practical training.

To strengthen academic and research collaborations by signing new MoUs to foster innovation and research. And to expand existing collaborations to offer more opportunities for students and faculty.

To organize workshops in schools to empower the students, focusing on practical self-defence techniques for personal safety and confidence. To acknowledge and reward students' innovative contributions, such as poster-making, and creative projects. To study the feasibility of initiating new PG/UG Programmes in the field of Commerce.

To Expand outreach initiatives by planning additional workshops, training sessions, and community engagement activities for holistic development.
